This IWD let us Congratulate Women of Maharashtra State in India for their First All Women 'Panchayat'*

For 26-year-old Sonali Shahpure, juggling household work with politics does not come naturally. She comes from a family of political non-starters. The political novice borrowed Rs. 50,000 from the local bank to pool money into the village development fund set up by the eleven elected members of the Bubnal gram panchayat in Shirol Taluka, southern Maharashtra. All members who chipped in with their share had one thing in common they were all women with no political background.

"In the morning, I take care of my family and children and step out later in the day to take care of the roads and drains in my village. Both are my priority now," said Ms. Shahpure. The village has taken a lead in women's political participation by becoming first in the State to adopt 100% political representation for women at the gram panchayat level. Elders of the village, who had decided six months ago to elect these women unopposed to the panchayat feel the group has brought in more transparency and accountability.

The members have pooled Rs. 5.5 lakh as development fund and are now petitioning the State government to sanction an additional special fund of Rs. 25,00,000 lakh for future development works. "We were fed up of the caste politics and the destruction seasoned politicians caused at the cost of development. So we decided to give all posts, including that of the *sarpanch*, (The Chief) to women. Each member will become *sarpanch* on a rotation basis," said Ulfatbai Afsar.

She said her nine-member council had just begun work on improving health and sanitation and water supply of the village.

*(The Panchayat raj is a South Asian political system found mainly in the nations of India, Pakistan, Bangladesh and Nepal. It is the oldest system of local government in the Indian subcontinent. The word raj means "rule" and panchayat means "assembly" (ayat) of five (panch). Traditionally panchayats consisted of wise and respected elders chosen and accepted by the local community. However, there were varying forms of such assemblies. Traditionally, these assemblies settled disputes between individuals and between villages. Mahatma Gandhi advocated panchayat raj as the foundation of India's political system. It would have been a decentralised form of government where each village would be responsible for its own affairs.)

Why I Wear Black on Thursdays



I am Achsah Joseph, working as an intern in All India Council of Christian Women. After I completed my graduation in engineering I joined AICCW to know about its work in enabling the Church Women to come forward and use their talents and gift in the expansion of reign of God.

It was during worship in NCCI chapel one thursday morning conducted by Moumita, (Executive Secretary, AICCW) I became aware about 'Thursdays in Black Campaign'. This campaign was started by the World Council of Churches in the 1980s as a form of peaceful protest against rape and violence especially taking place during wars and conflicts.

This Campaign has its roots in groups such as Mothers of the disappeared in Argentina, Black Sash in South Africa and the Women in Black movements in Bosnia and Israel.

The campaign focuses on ways that individuals can challenge attitudes that cause rape and violence. This campaign, which was launched in South Africa by the Diakonia Council of Churches during the 16 Days of Activism Campaign at the end of 2008, is an ongoing drive to raise awareness and encourage people to work towards a world without rape and violence against women and children.

In India also this campaign is practiced by many women. However we need to introduce it to local churches and communities also. I have started sharing about this campaign to my mother. Where ever we are we can share the information.

I have committed myself to observe 'Thursdays in Black Campaign' and break the silence to raise my voice against all the injustice and violence that happens to me or any woman, girl or child. Every Thursday we wear black as it reminds us of our commitment to reflect faith in action and build a world free of rape and violence. This campaign is very relevant for Indian context as India is the fourth dangerous country for a woman to live in and a girl child to be born. Rape has become a common culture in our country. Every 20 minutes a girl or a woman or

a child is raped in India. Marital rape is not even considered as crime. Many of you must have heard about the Nirbhaya case, where a young girl like me was brutally gang raped by young men in a bus. This is just one story there are many unheard stories.

This campaign is relevant for me, because I want safe and well lit roads, so that, women like me reach home safely after our work and tuition classes. I want protected public spaces be it in taxis, buses, market areas, workplace, schools/colleges and even safe homes. We do not feel safe in our own land and homes. And all of this just because I am a GIRL!

Just because I am a girl I am expected to be delicate and less accomplished than my opposite sex. I demand equality and freedom for every girl like me! I demand my right to feel safe and secure!

I have watched the video of Dr. Fulato Moyo, WCC

Programme Executive sharing about this campaign. And further looked into its Facebook page where I too was inspired to do something for this campaign. I am now helping AICCW/NCCI to make a video as an advocacy tool to promote "Thursdays in Black Campaign" and it will be a part of "365 Days of Zero Tolerance to Gender Based Violence: Make It Happen Now" campaign. My male colleagues in NCCI like



Jeswin and Sathia are supporting and helping me in it. This video will be my contribution to promote this campaign in churches, women's fellowship and youth groups. Let us together build "Planet 50-50 by 2030: Step it Up for Gender Equality"
