#### **NEWS FROM NCCI**

#### CULTIVATING PEACE WITH CREATION: NATIONAL SEASON OF CREATION 2025 UNFOLDS







The NCCI, together with its ecumenical partners, celebrated the national launch of the Season of Creation 2025 on 1 September at Andhra Christian Theological College (ACTC), Hyderabad, and continued the observance with a special gathering in Chennai YMCA on 3 September.

The inaugural event in Hyderabad, attended by nearly 200 participants—including members of the Telangana Council of Churches, faculty and students of ACTC—set the tone for a month-long ecumenical journey. Most Rev. Dr. Ruben Mark, Moderator of the Church of South India (CSI) and Chief Patron of the Telangana Council of Churches, and Rev. Dr. Packiam T. Samuel, Director of HMI and Vice-President of NCCI, sent their greetings. Rev. Dr. T. Bhasker, Secretary of TCC, hosted the national launch, while Rev. Dr. Varaprasad, Principal of ACTC, welcomed the gathering. The program, facilitated by Rev. Asher Noah, Executive Secretary of NCCI Dalit Concerns, along with Ms. Neelam Gaikwad and Mr. Anurag Nile, featured a creative youth presentation under the guidance of Mr. David Norfolk, TCC Youth Secretary.

As a symbolic act of commitment, participants planted 25 saplings on the ACTC campus and pledged to document and share stories of despair and resilience around the theme "Peace with Creation," the focus of the Season of Creation 2025. During the observance in Chennai, Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer, General Secretary of NCCI, intensified the

Ebenezer, General Secretary of NCCI, intensified the call for churches to collaborate with creation and renew the energy of the earth, challenging the Church to take concrete initiatives for ecological renewal. Rev. Dr. A. Joshuva Peter, Executive Secretary of UELCI and Treasurer of NCCI, underlined that the climate crisis is no longer a distant threat but an everyday reality in our homes and towns, demanding urgent collective action. In a session focusing on global climate concerns, Mr. Angelious Michael highlighted the importance of the upcoming UN COP30 and the role of faith communities in influencing international climate discourse. Ms. Neelam Gaikwad, Program Executive for NCCI Communication, Media and Relations, explored how social media can be used to promote peaceful coexistence with creation.

The spirit of Season of Creation carried in NCCI Campus in Nagpur on 4 September where the momentum forward, the NCCI reaffirmed its national witness to ecological justice, calling churches across India to pray, act, and advocate for the flourishing of all creation.

#### NCCI GENERAL BODY CHARTS FUTURE VISION AT ANNUAL MEETING



The National Council of Churches in India held its General Body Meeting on 10 September at the NCCI Campus, Nagpur, under the leadership of President H.G. Geevarghese Mar Yulios. Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer, NCCI General Secretary, presented the annual report highlighting the council's recent initiatives and laid out a futuristic vision for its mission and engagement in the coming years. Rev. Dr Pakiam T. Samuel, Vice-President of NCCI, led

the morning devotion. During the meeting, a new NEFGSD course on Human Sexuality from the School of Ecumenism was officially released, marking a significant step in fostering informed dialogue and inclusive theological education. Members expressed deep appreciation for the report and unanimously affirmed the strategic direction outlined, marking a renewed commitment to the ecumenical witness and service of NCCI.

#### INDIAN DISABILITY ECUMENICAL ACCOMPANIMENT (IDEA)

#### GIVING VOICE TO SILENCE: NCCI-IDEA MARKS INTERNATIONAL DAY OF SIGN LANGUAGES



The NCCI – IDEA marked the International Day of Sign Languages through its Monthly Online Fellowship for Persons with Disabilities on 6 September 2025.

Pastor G. Shrihari from the Nellore Deaf Church, Andhra Pradesh, delivered the reflection, tracing the genesis of sign language in India. He highlighted that the use of sign language to express emotions dates back to 1885, when Father Charles De Gaulle, a Roman Catholic missionary, initiated its development. Indian Sign Language gained official recognition in 2011 by the Government of India.

Pastor Shrihari also noted that there are around 300 different sign languages worldwide, used by over 72 million people, and shared insights on dealing with regional variations in India. He explained that such differences can often be understood by observing the visual gestures of trained interpreters.



The fellowship concluded by affirming that sign language breaks barriers for the deaf community, giving them a vital voice to communicate and participate fully in society. The gathering inspired participants to continue advocating for inclusion and accessibility in church and society.

#### NEWS FROM CHRISTIAN SERVICE AGENCY - CSA

#### CSA GENERAL BODY MAPS THE ROAD AHEAD FOR TRANSFORMATIVE SERVICE



The General Body of the Christian Service Agency (CSA) convened on 10 September, 2025, at the NCCI Campus, Nagpur, for its annual meeting, bringing together leaders and members committed to strengthening the church's social witness and service.

Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer, Secretary of CSA, presented the annual activities and project reports, highlighting ongoing development initiatives and the agency's

impact among marginalized communities. He also outlined an ambitious roadmap for the future, focusing on sustainable projects, innovative partnerships, and grassroots empowerment.

The meeting concluded with a renewed pledge to deepen CSA's commitment to justice, peace, and inclusive growth, ensuring that the agency continues to be a prophetic sign of hope and compassion in society.

#### NAI SUBAH – A NEW MORNING OF HOPE: INSPIRING ORGAN AND TISSUE DONATION



The "Nai Subah – New Morning: Gift of Life" Organ and Tissue Donation Awareness Programme, held on 2 September 2025 at the Seminar Hall of SFS College, Nagpur, became a powerful platform to inspire young minds towards the life-saving mission of organ and tissue donation. The initiative sought to educate and sensitise students on the profound significance of donating organs and tissues, while addressing common myths and misconceptions that often discourage people from taking this noble step. Students were introduced to advanced transplant procedures such as hand transplants, skin grafting, and other cutting-edge medical techniques, helping them gain insight into the remarkable progress in transplant medicine.

The event witnessed active participation from National Service Scheme (NSS) students. They raised thoughtful questions about the donation process, gov-

ernment schemes, hospital expenses, and the realities of organ transplantation, reflecting a genuine curiosity to understand and contribute to this life-giving cause. For many of them, this was their first exposure to the concept of tissue donation, sparking new awareness and interest.

By the close of the programme, the impact was tangible. Almost 60 students pledged to become organ donors, committing themselves to carry the message of hope beyond the walls of their college. The gathering not only dispelled long-held misconceptions but also nurtured a sense of community responsibility, marking a true "new morning" of compassion life-giving and commitment.

#### DISABILITY SENSITIZATION ENGAGES THEOLOGY STUDENTS AT MISSION INDIA SEMINARY



The Engaged Disability Nagpur hub conducted a Disability Sensitization programme on 12 September 2025 at Mission India Theology Seminary, Khadgaon, Nagpur, with nearly 90 theology students from across India in attendance.

Mr. Samuel Thayil introduced the ED Network and explained its mission to share information and resources, equip the Christian community to support people with disabilities and their families, and be a Christian voice on disability in dialogue with government, health sectors, NGOs, and the wider public. He also briefed the students on different types of disabilities.

Ms. Rupa Panchtilak shared her inspiring life story of overcoming challenges in education and employment despite being born with a disability in one hand. Her testimony, highlighting the support of an understanding partner, moved the students and helped them understand the daily struggles faced by people with disabilities.

The programme also featured a Braille Bible reading, a first-time experience for many, followed by a theological reflection on disability led by Pastor Saitsh Taskande.

Mr. Moses Gour, Nagpur ED Hub Coordinator, emphasized the church's responsibility to connect with persons with disabilities in congregations, provide Braille Bibles and songbooks, encourage volunteering to assist the disabled, build ramps for accessibility, and advocate with government agencies on disability concerns.

The event successfully sensitized theology students to the needs and rights of people with disabilities and fostering an inclusive and accessible ministry.

#### INDIA PEACE CENTRE BOARD CONVENES TO STRATEGIZE FUTURE INITIATIVES

Speakers from multiple faith traditions highlighted diversity as a sacred gift—reflected in festivals, food, languages, and cultures—and affirmed that humanity is the common core of all faiths.

Moderated by Mrs. Aradhana Upadhyay (Director, CNI-SSI), the panel featured Mrs. Rafeea Abid, Mrs. Opinder Kaur Bhasin, Ms. Nash Nusrat Ali, Dr. Puran Chandra Meshram, Mr. Angelious Michael, and Mr. Tejender Singh Raval. The gathering concluded with a call to safeguard pluralism and harmony, embracing diversity as a source of strength and peace.

#### ROAD TO COP30: THIRD ACADEMIC WEBINAR ON UN COP30



The third seminar in the India Peace Centre's "Towards UN COP30" series was held on 3 September 2025 at Gurukul Lutheran Theological College, Chennai, engaging theology students in lively discussion. Rev. Dr. Songram Basumatary, Princi-

pal, welcomed participants, stressing the value of climate education. Prof. Dr. Aravind moderated the session.

Mr. Angelious Michael, Director of the India Peace Centre, delivered a keynote address emphasizing climate advocacy as a crucial pathway to achieving climate justice and a sustainable planet. He provided an overview of the history and processes of the United Nations Conference of Parties (UN COP) and outlined key expectations for UN COP30. Highlighting the role of youth and students, he encouraged them to be active instruments of climate advocacy, both within their academic pursuits and by voicing their perspectives on global platforms such as the UN COP.

The seminar concluded with a renewed commitment among participants to engage with climate issues, translating knowledge into action for a sustainable and just future.

#### WCC TO HOST WEBINAR ON "AI AND OUR INFORMATION SOCIETY"

The World Council of Churches (WCC) will host the first in a series of webinars titled "AI and Our Information Society: The Good, The Bad, and The Ugly" on 15 October 2025. The session will explore the positive and negative impacts of artificial intelligence (AI) in digital communication.

As AI becomes increasingly integrated into platforms such as internet search engines, text generators, translation tools, and other digital services, it offers opportunities to enhance creativity, streamline tasks, and expand outreach. However, these tools

also present risks, including disinformation, deep fakes, targeted abuse, and reinforcement of bias.

The webinar will feature panelists discussing Al's potential for democratization and accessibility, while addressing challenges such as bias, stereotypes, exploitation, and exclusion. Topics will also include Al in education, chatbots, media and journalism, automation, training, and accessibility for journalists, especially in the Global South. The discussions aim to foster a critical understanding of Al's role in shaping society and information ecosystems. Read more...


