NEWS FROM NCCI

MANIPUR RELIEF COORDINATION MEETING HELD TO EXPLORE REHABILITATION SUPPORT



The National Council of Churches in India (NCCI) organized an online Manipur Relief Coordination Meeting on 26 September 2025 to discuss the continuing situation in Manipur and to discern collective ways to support rehabilitation efforts for affected communities. The meeting brought together representatives from NCCI, Christian Service Agency (CSA), Lutheran World Service India Trust (LWSIT), India Peace Centre (IPC), and friends from Manipur.

The discussion focused on understanding the ground realities and assessing the

urgent needs of displaced and traumatized people. The participants shared updates from various regions, highlighting both the immediate humanitarian needs and the long-term rehabilitation challenges. The meeting sought to identify how NCCI and its partners could coordinate and contribute effectively to the rebuilding and healing process in the region.

Through this consultation, a commitment was made to strengthen the solidarity network among member churches and agencies, and to initiate practical steps toward restoring hope and livelihoods for the people of Manipur. The meeting concluded with a call for sustained prayer, coordinated action, and compassionate accompaniment in the ongoing journey of recovery and reconciliation.

ECUMENICAL FORA

NATIONAL ECUMENICAL FORUM FOR GENDER AND SEXUAL DIVERSITY (NEFGSD)

EXPLORING FAITH AND INCLUSION: BLOCK COURSE ON HUMAN SEXUALITY AT KTC, MANGALORE



The NEFGSD facilitated a week-long Block Course on "BTE 51: Introduction to Human Sexuality" at the Karnataka Theological College (KTC), Mangalore, from 25th to 30th August 2025. The course was part of KTC's Bachelor of Theology program and carried 45 credit hours. It sought to help theological students understand human sexuality as a sacred and integral dimension of faith, creation, and community. The sessions were jointly led by Rev. Dr. S. D. Deva Jothi Kumar and Rev. Ribin John, representatives of NEFGSD, with

academic and pastoral support from Ms. Grace, Lecturer at KTC. NEFGSD's engagement aimed to strengthen inclusive theological education and nurture future church leaders to approach issues of sexuality, gender, and identity with pastoral sensitivity and biblical depth. Participants described the course as "transformative," "eye-opening," and "deeply pastoral," noting that it reshaped their understanding of inclusive biblical interpretation, queer theology, and pastoral care. Through initiatives like this, NEFGSD continues to promote inclusive and justice-oriented theological formation, equipping the next—generation of Christian leaders to create compassionate, affirming, and theologically grounded responses to issues of gender and sexuality within church and society.

PREPARING THE CHURCH FOR FUTURE DYNAMICS: CERTIFICATE COURSE ON HUMAN SEXUALITY



NEFGSD held a Certificate Course on Human Sexuality in Nagpur from 22–26 September 2025. The week-long event brought together 18 clergy, educators, and healthcare professionals from CSI, the Catholic Church, CEFI, and CMC Vellore to discuss how the Church may adapt to changing social and theological realities.

Human Library workshops gave students

direct insights into LGBTQ+ experiences as Rev. Dr. S. D. Deva Jothi Kumar, Rev. Ribin John, and others taught theology, ethics, pastoral care, and interfaith views. Participants said the course transformed their concept of inclusivity and pastoral duty. Vhavesh, a trans man, and his partner and Mr. Ajith Philip Ebenezer gave certificates during the valedictory event to show inclusivity. Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer (NCCI) and Dr. Inba Ignatius (NEFGSD) were praised for their leadership and assistance.

INDIAN DISABILITY ECUMENICAL ACCOMPANIMENT (NCCI-IDEA)

NCCI-IDEA FELLOWSHIP HIGHLIGHTS THE REALITIES OF INVISIBLE DISABILITIES





Rev Deacon Nimshi Stephen CSI Diocese of Malabar

On October 4, 2025, the NCCI–IDEA conducted their Monthly Persons with Disabilities Fellowship in advance of Global Invisible Disabilities Day. Rev. Deacon Nimshi Stephen of the CSI Malabar Diocese, ordained on 18 September 2025 and long-time NCCI–IDEA member, conducted the contemplation. After living with a neurological disease, she presented remarkable thoughts on religion, resilience, and empathy and inclusion for invisible impairments.

Rev. Deacon. Nimshi reminded attendees that "not all 2 disabilities are visible," reiterating that variety is God's intended creation and asking the Church to promote inclusion and accessibility. The fellowship reiterated NCCI–IDEA's commitment to developing an inclusive and compassionate Church that values all God's creation. The fellowship reaffirmed NCCI–IDEA's ongoing commitment to building a more inclusive, compassionate, and accessible faith community, where every person is valued as part of God's whole creation.

WOMEN CONCERNS

NCCI CONTINUES "THURSDAYS IN BLACK" SOLIDARITY CAMPAIGN



The "Thursdays in Black" campaign, a global protest against sexual harassment, rape, and all other forms of violence against women, continues to be supported by the Commission on Women Concerns, NCCI.

As a sign of unity and nonviolent protest, this initiative encourages individuals and groups to wear black on Thursdays and Women Concern released poster in the context of disability advocacy, women safety, season of creation and Dussehra, an-

nouncing a collective resolve to create a society in which women and girls may live in equality, safety, and dignity.

EMPOWERING YOUTHS: SKILL TRAINING WORKSHOP IN BUTIBORI



The Jan Vikas Kendra - CSA, in collaboration with the Industrial Training Institute (ITI), organized a one-day workshop on skill training for youths in the Maharashtra Industrial Area, Wardha Road, Butibori, on 24 September 2025.

The workshop aimed to equip young participants with practical skills to enhance their employability and prepare them for opportunities in industrial and vocational sectors.

Through interactive sessions and hands-on demonstrations, participants learned about emerging industry needs, skill development avenues, and pathways to sustainable livelihoods.

This initiative reflects CSA's ongoing commitment to youth empowerment and community development, fostering partnerships with local training institutes and development agencies to provide capacity building, skill enhancement, and socio-economic growth for young people in Maharashtra.

STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY IMPACT: LOK KALYAN YOJANA REVIEWS TEN ZONES



The Lok Kalyan Yojana organized a One-Day Review Meeting of Ten Zones of Nagpur on 27 September 2025 at the NCCI Campus, Nagpur. The meeting brought together zonal representatives and coordinators to review ongoing development initiatives, assess progress, and discuss strategies for strengthening community engagement and project

impact across Nagpur's ten operational zones. Participants shared field experiences, best practices, and challenges, fostering collective reflection and planning for the next phase of the program.

CSA EXTEND SUPPORT TO MANIPURI STUDENTS AT CSI RAINY SCHOOL OF NURSING



The CSA staff and Local Pastor from Manipur made separate visits to meet Manipuri students pursuing their studies at the CSI Rainy School of Nursing, Chennai. The CSA team visited the students as part of their ongoing accompaniment and support initiative, engaging

them in discussions about their studies, experiences, and aspirations. The visit focused on ensuring the wellbeing of the students and reaffirming CSA's commitment to nurturing young leaders from Manipur. Manipur pastors met with the students, offering prayers, fellowship, and words of encouragement. Their presence provided spiritual strength and a sense of belonging to the students living and studying away from their home state. Fr. Thomas Ninan, Chief Coordinator of CSA has mobilised Rupees 14 Lakhs on local contributions till date to support these students.

FEEDING, FAITH AND FELLOWSHIP: 5,000 PILGRIMS SERVED ON DHAMMA CHAKRA PRAVARTAN DIWAS



On the occasion of Dhamma Chakra Pravartan Diwas, the Lok Kalyan Yojana, an initiative of the Christian Service Agency (CSA), organized a special outreach event to serve pilgrims visiting the area. The program aimed to provide food, water, and spiritual support to thousands of devotees gathered for the celebration.

The event was inaugurated by Rev. Jebaraj, CSI Pastor from the Dalit Department, and Mr. Devasirvatham, member of the NCCI Urban

Rural Mission (URM). It featured songs, reflections, and messages that uplifted the spirit of unity and compassion.

More than 5,000 pilgrims were served nutritious food and water, ensuring their well-being during their spiritual journey. Inspirational addresses were delivered by Rev. Jebaraj from Chennai and Mr. Rajesh Jadhav of NCCI–URM, who highlighted the importance of unity, the Indian Constitution, and collective social responsibility. The event was a resounding success, showcasing CSA's commitment to service, solidarity, and social harmony. Special appreciation was extended to Mr. Sanjay Wankhede, Coordinator of Lok Kalyan Yojana–CSA, for his dedicated leadership and efficient organization of the program.

URBAL RURAL MISSION (NCCI-URM)

WORLD RIVERS DAY WEEK - REVIVING THE NAG RIVER: A CALL FOR RESTORATION



The NCCI-Urban Rural Mission (URM), in collaboration with the CNI-Social Service Institute (SSI), observed the first event of World Rivers Day Week on 25 September 2025 at Nagpur. The gathering brought together church leaders, environmental advocates, and community representatives to reflect on the plight of Nagpur's own Nag River, once a lifeline of the city and now severely polluted and reduced to a drainage channel.

The event was graced by Ms. Aradhana

Upadhyay, Director of CNI–SSI, Rev. Kuluthangan, former Director of the Maharashtra Village Ministry, and Pastor Lal, who works closely with migrant communities, alongside staff and students of CNI–SSI. Discussions focused on the ecological and social implications of water mismanagement, unplanned urban expansion, and environmental neglect.

Speakers stressed the urgent need to reclaim the Nag River's natural flow through sustained community participation, policy advocacy, and theological reflection on creation care. Participants also pledged to initiate awareness campaigns and eco-education programs promoting river restoration and responsible water stewardship. The session concluded with a prayer by Rev. Kuluthangan, reaffirming faith-based commitment to ecological justice and the preservation of God's creation.

NCCI LEADERS JOIN NAGPUR CONSULTATION ON PROTECTING MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES



A consultation meeting was held in Nagpur on 22 September 2025 to discuss measures for protecting marginalized communities affected by oppression, including Dalits, Adivasis, Christians, Muslims, and Buddhists. The meeting was coordinated by Dr. Selvi, which brought together leaders representing over 30 organisations with the presence of Dr. Thol Tirumavalvan, MP and President of Viduthalai Chiruthaigal Katchi (VCK), which encouraged

and motivated the participants to move forward with the cause. Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer, General Secretary of NCCI, along with other NCCI representatives, actively participated in the discussions, sharing insights on faith-based advocacy, social justice, and inter-community solidarity. Participants exchanged experiences and strategies to strengthen protection and empowerment for vulnerable groups at the margins of society. NCCI will facilitate to such types meetings in different contexts.

PASTORS' PILGRIMAGE VISIT TO DIKSHABHOOMI: A JOURNEY OF FAITH, JUSTICE, AND SOLIDARITY



From 30 September to 2 October 2025, a delegation of Pastors from CSI Madras Diocese undertook a meaningful pilgrimage visit to Nagpur, engaging deeply with social, theological, and justice-oriented movements connected to the legacy of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar. The visit featured interactions with Dr. Yugal Rayalu (CPI-M) on caste-class solidarity, Dr. Roger Gaikwad on OBC and Gospel

intersections, and Adv. Kamble of Samta Sainik Dal on Ambedkarite organizing. Mr. Mangesh Dahiwale, former civil servant, shared reflections on on Ambedkarite movements and interreligious Dalit solidarity. The pastors also visited Dikshabhoomi, and the Gowari Martyrs Memorial, followed by a meaningful interaction with Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer and NCCI and CSA staff at the NCCI Campus. The pilgrimage concluded with participation in Dhamma Chakra Pravartan Diwas, where the pastors engaged with pilgrims and reflected on Ambedkar's message of equality, faith, and liberation. INDIA PEACE CENTRE (IPC)

INTERFAITH ROUNDTABLE ON CLIMATE ACTION MARKS IPC'S LEAD-UP TO UN COP30



The India Peace Centre (IPC), in collaboration with the Office of Public Affairs of the National Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is, organized an Interfaith Roundtable on Climate Action at the Lotus Temple, New Delhi, on 19 September 2025, as part of preparations for UN COP30. Nine faith leaders and representatives shared perspectives on the urgent need to combat climate change, emphasizing minimal consumption, and influencing both faith

communities and policymakers. This roundtable marked the first of seven interfaith seminars organized by IPC ahead of COP30. IPC expressed sincere gratitude to the Baha'i Office of Public Affairs and Ms. Nilakshi Rajkhowa, Director, for facilitating a meaningful and well-coordinated discussion.

SOUTH ASIA YOUTH CONSULTATION: CELEBRATING IDENTITIES, EMBRACING DIVERSITY



The South Asia Youth Consultation of the Council for World Mission (CWM) was held from October 2 to 5, 2025, at the CSI Centre, Chennai, under the theme "Celebrating Identities: Cultural Hegemonies and Diversities." The consultation brought together young leaders and representatives from across South Asia to engage in deep reflection, creative dialogue, and collective action on issues of identity, inclusion, and justice in contemporary society. The

collaborative leadership of NCCI, CSI, IPC, and CWM reaffirmed the shared commitment to empowering youth toward justice, inclusivity, and transformative action in church and society.

FACE TO FACE 2025: YOUTH FROM EIGHT NATIONS UNITE FOR INTERFAITH HARMONY



IPC hosts Face to Face 2025 from 4 October to 2 November 2025 in Nagpur and New Delhi, bringing together young participants from eight countries under the theme "Interfaith Harmony – Promoting Peaceful Communities." This unique encounter offered participants an immersive experience of India's diverse faith traditions, cultures, and languages. The program was formally inaugurated on 8

October at the IPC, where delegates were welcomed with traditional hospitality. Participants symbolically watered a Tulsi plant, representing life, healing, and harmony with creation.

Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer, Chairperson of IPC, delivered the reflection, emphasizing interfaith solidarity and peacebuilding, while Mr. Angelious Michael, Director of IPC, moderated the ceremony. Distinguished guests also greeted and felicitated the international participants. This marks the second Face to Face program in two years, that IPC has facilitated for CWM and NCCI.

KARNATAKA REGIONAL COUNCIL

KARNATAKA CHURCH LEADERS CONVENE TO STRENGTHEN REGIONAL CHRISTIAN COUNCIL



The meeting of the Karnataka Christian Council was held on 30th September from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM. The session included participation from Mr. Elish Andrews (KAS Officer), Mr. Jaffet (Chairperson, Minority Department), and representatives from the Karnataka Central Diocese (KCD), KND, Hubli Brethren Assembly, Methodist Church, and the Bible Society of India (BSI). The meeting was chaired by

representatives from NCCI. During the session, Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer, General Secretary of NCCI, highlighted the importance of the Regional Christian Council as a platform for fostering ecumenical collaboration, dialogue, and coordinated action among churches in the region. The meeting provided an opportunity for leaders to discuss shared challenges, explore collaborative initiatives, and strengthen inter-church relationships, emphasizing the role of the Regional Christian Council in promoting unity and joint mission in Karnataka.

LUTHERAN WORLD SERVICE INDIA TRUST (LWSIT)

REACHING OUT IN CRISIS: RELIEF DISTRIBUTED TO FAMILIES IN UTTARAKHAND AND DELHI



In Uttarakhand and Delhi, the Lutheran World Service India Trust (LWSIT) accomplished distributing aid to households impacted by natural calamities. Rev. Jyoti Singh and local contacts helped coordinate the distribution of supplies to 100 people impacted by the cloudburst in Uttarakhand by two LWSIT employees.



The team then travelled to Delhi to evaluate the assistance need for populations hit by the floods. The crew provided 200 impacted households with relief goods with the help of Ms. Sanjukta Mohanty and in cooperation with NCCI-CSA, guaranteeing prompt aid to individuals affected by the floods.

CHURCH OF SOUTH INDIA (CSI)

PRAYER FOR PEACE IN CONTEXT OF WAR ORGANIZED BY CSI MADRAS DIOCESE

The Board for Diaconal Ministry, CSI Madras Diocese, organized a special Prayer for Peace in the Context of War on 26 September 2025, Friday, from 6:00 to 7:00 AM. The session brought together clergy and laity to pray for peace, justice, and reconciliation in troubled regions, particularly in the context of World Week of Prayer for Peace in Palestine and Israel.

The program opened with a prayer by the Madras South Area Chairman, followed by a Lament Litany led by Rev. Sheeba Jashva. The Call to Confession and Prayer of Confession was led by Bishop Amma Rev. Indra Paul, with Assurance of Pardon offered by Rt. Rev. Paul Francis Ravichandran.

Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer, NCCI General Secretary, conveyed greetings and emphasized the urgent need for peace amid global unrest. A reflection was shared by the Bishop, followed by intercession prayers for peaceful resolutions led by the Madras North Area Chairman, Central Area Chairman, and a special prayer for Palestine. The session concluded with the Closing Prayer by the Southern Area Chairman and Benediction from Bishop Rt. Rev. Paul Francis Ravichandran, marking a solemn call for peace and reconciliation.

CHURCH OF SOUTH INDIA CELEBRATES 78TH FORMATION DAY



The Church of South India (CSI) joyfully celebrated its 78th Formation Day on 27 September 2025, marking over seven decades of united witness, faith, and service. Founded in 1947 through the historic union of Anglican, Methodist, Congregational, and Presbyterian churches, CSI emerged as a pioneering model of ecumenical collaboration, embodying the vision of unity in diversity.

NCCI acknowledges the CSI's commitment to ecumenism, reflecting on the ongoing journey of being and becoming "one"—a call to nurture fellowship, dialogue, and collaborative witness among all churches.

WCC HIGHLIGHTS "FROM CREED TO DEED"

During an international partner consultation hosted by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Württemberg, Germany Rev. Prof. Dr. Jerry Pillay, WCC General Secretary, on the theme "Nicaea 2025: Faith – Mission – Unity." On 24 September, Pillay reflected on the faith dimension, marking the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea. He emphasized that while the Nicene Creed may be challenging for some to fully grasp or use liturgically, its faith is widely shared and must be embodied in action, not just recited.

The Nicene faith, he noted, continues to unite Christians across cultures and centuries, calling for witness that resists domination and advances God's reign of justice. Read more...

INTERNATIONAL CONSULTATION ON AI AND POSTHUMANISM BEGINS IN MALAYSIA

The CCA launched a four-day international consultation on "Artificial Intelligence and Posthumanism: Ethical and Theological Perspectives" on 1 October 2025 in Cyberjaya, Malaysia. The event was inaugurated by Dr. Mathews George Chunakara, CCA General Secretary, with a welcome by Dr. Anna Alisha Mathew Simon, Vice-Moderator. Thirty-five

participants—including theologians, ethicists, scientists, and social scientists—attended. The first thematic session, "Al and Posthumanism: Changing Global Contexts and Trends", was presented by Dr. Levi Checketts, who explored the intersection of Al, transhumanism, and ethical theology, emphasizing the need to include marginalized communities in shaping Al for the common good. 





