Building Beautiful Friendships in the New Year: Lessons from Mary and Elizabeth

A Biblical Blueprint for Meaningful Women's Relationships as We Begin Anew

As we step into a new year filled with fresh possibilities and renewed commitments, there's no better time to reflect on the quality of our friendships and intentionally cultivate the relationships that will sustain us through the months ahead. In a world where female friendships are often portrayed through the lens of competition, drama, or superficiality, the story of Mary and Elizabeth offers us a refreshing and profound alternative—a timeless template for building authentic, supportive, and life-giving connections between women.

The Story: A Divine Encounter

When Mary, a young teenager, received the earth-shattering news that she would bear the Son of God, she didn't retreat into isolation. Instead, she journeyed to the hill country of Judea to visit her relative Elizabeth, who was six months pregnant with John the Baptist. What unfolded was one of the most beautiful moments of female solidarity in scripture.

As Mary entered Elizabeth's home and greeted her, something extraordinary happened. Elizabeth's baby leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, blessed Mary with words that would echo through eternity: "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the child you will bear!"

Seven Principles for Building Strong Female Friendships This Year

1. Seek Out Relationships Across Generations

Mary was young, likely a teenager. Elizabeth was older, described as "well along in years." Yet their age difference became a source of strength rather than division. Elizabeth's maturity and life experience provided wisdom and reassurance that Mary desperately needed, while Mary's youthful faith and courage likely inspired Elizabeth.

New Year Application: As you set intentions for this year, consider who you might mentor and who might mentor you. Make it a goal to develop at least one meaningful cross-generational friendship. Don't limit your friendships to women in your exact life stage. Seek mentors who have walked paths you're beginning, and embrace opportunities to guide younger women. These relationships provide perspective, wisdom, and fresh energy that same-age friendships sometimes cannot.

2. Celebrate Each Other's Blessings Without Comparison

Here's what makes this story remarkable: both women were experiencing miraculous pregnancies. Elizabeth could have felt overshadowed—after all, Mary was carrying the

Messiah. Instead, she celebrated Mary's blessing with genuine joy and humility. There was no competition, no jealousy, only pure celebration.

New Year Application: Make this the year you break free from the comparison trap. Practice genuinely rejoicing when your friends succeed, even in areas where you're struggling. When your friend gets the promotion you wanted, the relationship you're praying for, or the breakthrough you're waiting for, choose celebration over comparison. True friendship creates space for multiple victories. This year, commit to being your friends' biggest cheerleader.

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3. Offer Affirmation and Encouragement Freely

Elizabeth didn't hold back her affirmation. She blessed Mary publicly and enthusiastically, acknowledging both her favor and her faith. She spoke life into Mary's situation at a time when Mary likely faced doubt and fear about her unexpected pregnancy.

New Year Application: In this new year, be generous with your words of encouragement. Challenge yourself to send at least one affirming message to a friend each week. Tell your friends specifically what you admire about them. Affirm their character, their choices, their gifts. In a world full of criticism, be the voice that speaks life and truth into your friends' lives. Let this be the year you become known for your encouragement.

4. Create Safe Spaces for Vulnerability

Mary travelled approximately 80-100 miles to reach Elizabeth—a difficult journey in ancient times. She knew Elizabeth's home would be a safe place to process her overwhelming experience. And indeed, Elizabeth received her with understanding, not judgment.

New Year Application: This year, commit to being the friend who creates emotional safety. This means listening without immediately offering solutions, maintaining confidentiality, and responding with grace rather than shock when friends share their struggles. Make your home, your coffee dates, your phone calls safe harbors where

friends can be honest about their fears, doubts, and challenges. In this new year, be someone's safe place.

5. Recognize and Validate Each Other's Experiences

Elizabeth acknowledged the magnitude of what Mary was experiencing. She didn't minimize it or make it about herself. She recognized that Mary was carrying something precious and treated both Mary and her situation with honour and reverence.

New Year Application: As you navigate this year's conversations with friends, resist the urge to immediately relate everything to your own story. Sometimes the most loving thing you can do is simply acknowledge and validate what your friend is going through without making it about you. Practice the discipline of focused listening—truly hearing your friends' experiences without mentally preparing your response.

6. Provide Practical Support

The scripture tells us that Mary stayed with Elizabeth for about three months. This wasn't just a weekend visit—Mary provided companionship and likely practical help to Elizabeth during the final months of her pregnancy. She showed up with her time and presence.

New Year Application: In this new year, move beyond good intentions to concrete actions. Don't just say "let me know if you need anything." Be specific in your offers of help. Bring a meal, offer to watch the kids, help with job applications, or simply show up to keep someone company. Put dates on your calendar now for checking in with friends who are going through difficult seasons. Practical support demonstrates that your care is more than words.

7. Share Spiritual Journeys Together

Both women were experiencing God's movement in profound ways, and they shared that spiritual journey together. Mary's response to Elizabeth's blessing was the Magnificat, a beautiful prayer of praise. Their time together was marked by worship, wonder, and spiritual connection.

New Year Application: Make this the year you deepen the spiritual dimension of your friendships. Invite your friends into your spiritual life. Start a practice of praying together regularly, share what you're learning, discuss your questions and doubts, worship together. Consider forming a small group or prayer partnership. Friendships rooted in shared faith have a depth and resilience that purely social friendships often lack.

The Fruit of Authentic Friendship

The relationship between Mary and Elizabeth teaches us that women's friendships should be characterized by mutual honour, generous celebration, and genuine support. These relationships don't happen by accident—they require intentionality, humility, and emotional maturity.

Consider what this friendship provided for both women:

- Validation in experiences that others might not understand
- Companionship during seasons of significant life change
- Encouragement to embrace their unique callings
- Spiritual support as they navigated God's purposes for their lives
- Joy that multiplied rather than diminished through sharing

A New Year Action Plan: Cultivating Mary-and-Elizabeth Friendships

As you plan for the year ahead, consider making these practical commitments:

January-March: Foundation Building

- Identify 2-3 women you want to invest in more deeply this year
- Schedule regular monthly gatherings (coffee dates, walks, phone calls)
- Begin a practice of sending weekly encouragement texts

April-June: Deepening Connection

- Share a vulnerable moment or struggle with a trusted friend
- Offer practical help to a friend going through a difficult season
- Start or join a women's Bible study or prayer group

July-September: Expanding Your Circle

- Reach out to someone from a different generation
- Celebrate a friend's success intentionally (throw a small party, write a heartfelt note)
- Forgive a friendship disappointment and reconnect

October-December: Sustaining Momentum

- Reflect on how your friendships have grown this year
- Express gratitude to the women who have blessed your life
- Plan how you'll continue investing in these relationships into the next year

New Year Resolutions for Friendship

Consider making one or more of these specific commitments:

1. **Reach out intentionally.** Like Mary's journey to Elizabeth, building deep friendships requires effort. Don't wait for friendships to happen—pursue them. Make the first move this year.
2. **Practice vulnerability.** Share not just your highlight reel but your real struggles and questions. Let this be the year you let people see the real you.

3. **Check your heart.** Regularly examine whether you're genuinely happy for your friends' successes or harboring secret resentment. Make jealousy-free friendship a goal.
4. **Invest time.** Deep friendships require consistent investment. Schedule regular time together, even when life gets busy. Put friendship dates on your calendar like any other important appointment.
5. **Speak words of life.** Make it a habit to affirm and encourage the women in your life. Set a goal: one encouraging message per week.
6. **Show up in hard times.** Be present not just for the celebrations but for the challenges, losses, and ordinary difficult days. This year, be the friend who doesn't disappear when things get tough.
7. **Forgive quickly.** No friendship is perfect. Extend grace when friends disappoint you, and ask for forgiveness when you fall short. Don't let this year's friendships carry last year's grudges.

A New Year Call to Sisterhood

The Holy Scriptures remind us that the Creator made both male and female “in His image” (Genesis 1:27), affirming equality, dignity and divine purposes for every person. This means that as human beings both men and women are endowed with unique gifts, talents, and abilities which are, if used to serve will make a lasting difference in the society through our lives. Each one carries a divine spark of creativity, compassion, and resilience that has the power to bring change to families, communities and nations. Chapter 3:25 beautifully states, "*She is clothed with strength and dignity; she can laugh at the days to come.*" This verse sums up the core character of a woman who has unleashed her God-given potential.

Conclusion

Jesus Christ in Mark 9:23 said, "Everything is possible for one who believes." Let every woman believe this with all her heart - believe how wonderfully she is created, in the gifts given by God, and Faith in that everything is possible with the one who believes. Unleashing the potential within us is a journey of faith.

Helen Keller said, "*Alone we can do so little; together we can do so much.*" Let us encourage one another to grow, learn, and serve. NCCI WOMEN CONCERN

Respected Bishop/General Secretary,

Grace and peace to you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

We write to invite our church community to join millions worldwide in observing the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence, which runs annually from November 25th (International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women) to December 10th (International Human Rights Day). The theme for the 2025 16 Days of Activism is *UNITE to End Digital Violence against All Women and Girls*.

As people of faith, we are called to stand against all forms of injustice and oppression. Violence against women and girls is a grave violation of human dignity and contradicts the biblical truth that every person is created in the image of God (Genesis 1:27). This campaign provides us an opportunity to raise awareness, take action, and be agents of transformation in our community.

Why the Church Must Respond

The statistics are sobering—globally, one in three women experiences physical or sexual violence in their lifetime. Our silence can inadvertently enable this injustice. As followers of Christ who proclaimed good news to the oppressed and freedom for the captives (Luke 4:18), we must actively work toward a world where all people live free from fear and violence.

Proposed Activities for Our Church Community

Week 1: Awareness and Education (November 25-December 1)

- Dedicate Sunday service to address gender-based violence with relevant scripture and testimonies
- Host an awareness session on recognizing signs of domestic abuse
- Display orange ribbons and decorations (orange is the campaign's official color)
- Share educational materials and statistics in bulletins and social media

Week 2: Prayer and Reflection (December 2-8)

- Organize daily prayer vigils for survivors and those affected by violence
- Create a prayer wall where congregants can post anonymous prayers
- Host a candlelight vigil in memory of victims
- Facilitate small group discussions on healthy relationships and biblical models of respect

Week 3: Action and Advocacy (December 9-10)

- Partner with local women's shelters or crisis centres
- Organize donation drives (toiletries, clothing, household items)
- Invite speakers from support organizations to share resources

- Launch a mentorship program for vulnerable women and youth
- Commit to policy advocacy by writing to local representatives.
- Organize a peaceful community rally or march to raise public awareness and demonstrate solidarity
- Conduct lobbying efforts by meeting with local government officials and legislators to advocate for stronger laws protecting women

Additional Action Steps

- *Training and Capacity Building:* Provide training for church leaders on pastoral care for abuse survivors and appropriate referral pathways
- *Safe Spaces:* Ensure our church is a safe space by establishing clear policies against harassment and abuse
- *Youth Engagement:* Organize workshops for young people on respectful relationships, consent, and gender equality
- *Men's Involvement:* Create forums for men and boys to discuss positive masculinity and their role in ending violence
- *Economic Empowerment:* Support skill-building programs for women to achieve financial independence
- *Ongoing Commitment:* Establish a task force to continue this work beyond the 16 days

How You Can Participate

- ❖ Attend services and events throughout the 16 days
- ❖ Wear orange to show solidarity
- ❖ Share information and resources with your networks
- ❖ Volunteer with local support organizations
- ❖ Make financial contributions to support survivors
- ❖ Examine your own attitudes and challenge harmful beliefs
- ❖ Speak up when you witness disrespect or violence

We find our encouragement from the Scripture

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

World Day of Prayer is an annual global ecumenical Christian initiative, led by women, that takes place on the first Friday of March. It is a movement of prayer and action that involves over 170 countries and uses the *motto "Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action"*. Participants gather to pray for common causes, learn about the concerns of sisters in other countries, and engage in prayerful action for global issues such as peace and justice.

- **Purpose:** The movement aims to bring together Christian women of various backgrounds for a common day of prayer and to build fellowship, understanding, and action throughout the year.
- **Activities:** Christians in over 170 countries celebrate on the first Friday of March. They participate in a common day of prayer and learn how to pray for specific global issues and the needs of women and children.
- **Motto:** The movement's motto is "Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action," emphasizing that prayer and action are inseparable.
- **History:** The initiative began as a way for women to support women and children, and it has grown into a large, international movement with a history of uniting women of diverse traditions.

The National Council of Churches in India (NCCI) (NCCI) Women's Concern is a part of the global World Day of Prayer (WDP), an ecumenical movement of Christian women who pray together annually on the first Friday of March. Through this movement, Indian women, along with Christian women worldwide, use "Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action" to address issues, share burdens, and support projects for justice and peace, such as tackling gender-based violence and promoting child rights.

What the movement does:

- **Prays for a specific country:** Each year, the WDP's resources are prepared by a different country, and the prayer services focus on that country's theme.
- **Raises funds:** Offerings from prayer services are used to fund projects and initiatives for women's justice and peace.
- **Promotes social action:** It encourages action on various issues, such as gender-based violence, child rights, and environmental concerns. The NCCI's women's concern promotes campaigns like "365 Days Zero Tolerance to Gender Based Violence" in connection with WDP.
- **Enriches faith:** It fosters a deeper understanding of faith by sharing the experiences of Christians from different countries and cultures.

FELLOWSHIP OF THE LEAST COIN



The Fellowship of the Least Coin (FLC) is a global ecumenical prayer movement for justice, peace, and reconciliation led by Christian women for women and girls all over the world.

Women of all ethnicities, nationalities, ages, educational backgrounds, and socioeconomic statuses are invited to participate in this global movement by praying for justice, peace, and reconciliation in their own lives whenever they experience personal conflicts and challenges. As well, they are invited to pray for justice, peace, and reconciliation for women and girls all over the world who face injustice, violence, and poverty every day.

It includes "least" coins...

As tokens of these prayers, women are encouraged to set aside the least coin in their country's currency. Only the least coin is offered so that women of all backgrounds and means can be equal partners in justice- and peace-making.

These least coins are then collected by Christian women's groups and ecumenical women's organizations in countries and regions all over the world. They are then forwarded to the Fellowship of the Least Coin (FLC) Fund, which is faithfully stewarded by the International Committee for the Fellowship of the Least Coin (ICFLC).

The "Fellowship of the Least Coin" (FLC) is a global ecumenical prayer movement for justice, peace, and reconciliation, led by Christian women and coordinated with the National Council of Churches in India (NCCI). The **Women Concern** of the NCCI actively promotes the FLC, which involves collecting the "least coin" of one's currency as a symbol of prayer, with the collected funds being used for projects that support women and children worldwide. These funds support initiatives for education, economic self-reliance, and

gender justice, and the movement aims to foster a sense of prayerful solidarity for women and girls facing hardship globally.

- **Global Movement:** The Fellowship of the Least Coin (FLC) is an international ecumenical prayer movement for justice, peace, and reconciliation, spearheaded by Christian women.
- **NCCI's Role:** The National Council of Churches in India (NCCI) coordinates and promotes the FLC through its Women Concern .
- **Prayer and Action:** Participants pray for personal and global challenges and are encouraged to set aside the "least coin" in their currency as a symbol of their commitment.
- **Funding Projects:** The collected coins are sent to a central fund, which supports projects for women and children globally. These projects include educational programs, skill-building initiatives, and efforts to promote economic self-reliance and gender justice.
- **Focus on Women and Children:** The movement provides support for a wide range of initiatives for women and girls, such as literacy classes, vocational training, and leadership development.

THURSDAY IN BLACK

"Thursday in Black" is a global campaign against sexual and gender-based violence, a movement the Women's Concerns of the National Council of Churches in India (NCCI) actively supports. The campaign encourages people to wear black every Thursday as a visible sign of solidarity and protest.

Thursday in Black campaign

The movement is a peaceful protest against the violence women and girls face globally.

Symbolism

- **Black clothing:** Serves as a symbol of resistance and a way to mourn the suffering and pain caused by sexual violence.
- **Safety and respect:** The campaign works toward a world where women, men, and children are safe from rape and violence in all parts of society.

The NCCI's role in the campaign

The NCCI's Women's Concerns spearheads the "Thursday in Black" campaign within India, carrying out its advocacy efforts through prayer and other initiatives.

Goals of the ministry

- Advocate for gender mainstreaming in the Church and society.
- Enhance church women's ability to create inclusive communities based on justice, peace, and reconciliation.
- Challenge attitudes that perpetuate rape and violence on both a personal and public level.

Calls to action

- Wear black every Thursday to visibly support the global movement.
- Join discussions on how to reduce domestic violence within the community.
- Pray for survivors and commit to action that brings justice and safety for everyone.
- Transform despair and anger about violence into political action.

How to get involved

- **Wear black:** Make a point to wear black clothing or a campaign badge on Thursdays.
- **Join the discussion:** Engage with the NCCI and the World Council of Churches through their social media channels using hashtags like #ThursdaysInBlack .
- **Support survivors:** Listen to and amplify the voices of survivors, and support organizations that provide resources and shelter for victims of violence.

BELIEVERS EASTERN CHURCH

Church's major women empowerment initiatives, such as **Adult Literacy Project, Self-Sustainability Project, and the Health Care Project** are designed to reach women at the grassroots level. These projects are implemented through trained and skilled workers who responsibly organize awareness programs and enroll women into various development activities. Their passionate involvement ensures that every initiative touches the lives of women in meaningful and practical ways.

Under the **Adult Literacy Project**, we have developed and printed a comprehensive literacy curriculum in 16 languages. Through the active promotion of this program, we have successfully started 200 new literacy units in the current year 2025. Hundreds of women are enrolled, gaining the ability to read and write – skills which open doors to confidence, participation, self-reliance and self-worth.



The **Self-Sustainability Project** focuses on equipping women with vocational and entrepreneurial skills. Tailoring units and skill development programs have been established to enable women to earn an income and support their families. These initiatives are helping women build self-esteem, leadership qualities and open ways to live with dignity.

Recognizing the significant importance of women's health, through the **Health Care Project** we have organized awareness programs covering topics such as maternal care, nutrition for children, and preventive health care practices. These programs have created significant impact by encouraging women to prioritize their well-being and make informed choices for healthier lives.

Through these sustained efforts, the Department of Women continues to transform lives by developing women in their skills, strengthening families, and nurturing communities for a better and brighter future.

GELC consists of 5 dioceses named South West Diocese (Odisha) Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Tamilnadu, Kerala, Karnataka) South East Diocese (Jharkhand, West Bengal, Andaman and Nicobar Islands), North West Diocese (Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, New Delhi, Punjab, Haryana) North East Diocese (Assam, Arunachal Pradesh), and the Council of Ranchi congregation (CRC) in Jharkhand. The Moderator of our Church is Rt. Rev. Marshall Kerketta. Our women's Desk is associated with all the Dioceses and CRC women's committees and a central women's desk named '**Kalisya Mahila Sangh**'. The head office is located in Ranchi.

Yearly Activities in GEL Church

1. The Kalisya Mahila Sangh had observed **International Women's Day on 8 March 2025**. Different activities were conducted at various locations of the Church. An WDP as instructed by NCCI women's department for Cook Islands.
2. On 27th April 2025, Women Sunday was observed. In the different congregation's women leaders lead the church service on that day.
3. The month of May and June was the time to conduct Diocese level women conferences. Every year we conduct a blood donation camp on **Mother's Day**, this year it was held on 11th of May 2025 by Jamshedpur Parish.
4. A tree plantation campaign was also conducted to contribute towards climate justice. More than 2000 trees were planted on 10th July 2025, at GELC. This will be a regular program from now onwards.
5. The Central women conference and Seminar is conducted every alternative year in the month of October. This year, the conference was held at the Andaman and Nicobar Islands. More than 2500 people participated in this program. It was planned to conduct a Seminar in North East Diocese, Assam, next year for 300 lay women leaders, who are leading the parish-level women committees.
6. On 22nd and 23rd October, the 25 Years of Women Ordination Silver Jubilee Celebration was held under the leadership of Rev. Sosirita Kandulna (Women Desk Secretary), Mrs. Shama Rani Kandulna (President) and Mrs. Kusum Aind (Treasurer) GEL Church, under guidance of Central Council GELC, in Ranchi. Rev. Jyoti Singh, NCCI Women's Desk General Secretary was the Chief Guest on that auspicious occasion.



We were privileged to have the presence of few dignitaries, who have encouraged us - Agriculture Minister Mrs. Shilpi Neha Tirkey, Rajya Sabha member Mrs. Mahua Maji, MLA Naman Biksal Kongari. UELCI Executive Secretary Rev. Dr. Joshua Peter, Rev. Elina Soren (Vice President UELCI) LWF Council Member Mrs. Ranjita Borgowary,

Rt. Rev. Marshall Kerketta, Moderator GELC, General Secretary Iswardutt Kandulna and others presented as the Guests of honour. 52 women are ordained, till date. The 1st women Ordination took place on 26 October 2000, ordaining three women namely, *Rev. Merian Minz, Rev. Isabella Barla and Rev. Ashisan Kandulna*.

7. November was the time to remember the Fellowship of least coin, materials have been distributed for celebrating its motto meaningfully. 16 days of activities have been planned including an awareness program with the schools of our Church, focusing on girl children this year.
8. The women committees have also planned to take up few social work activities among the poor and needy, like helping orphanages and also remote places for ministry in December.



The above-mentioned are the yearly activities that is taken up throughout the year, besides the local programs organized by individual congregations.

The **Presbyterian Women's Fellowship (PWF), PCI** continues to serve as a vibrant fellowship of over **8,50,000 women** across all Synods of the Presbyterian Church of India, promoting spiritual growth, leadership, and collective mission. Between **2023 and 2025**, the Fellowship undertook several meaningful programmes, including **Workshops and Consultations** on women's empowerment, theological understanding, and leadership development, as well as **Prayer Observances** such as the PWF Prayer Day and the World Day of Prayer.



The **Charitable Outreach at Christmas** was entrusted to one of the Units to organize special programmes and extend care and support to needy and **underprivileged children**. In addition, the **Rebuilding Manipur Project** was extended to assist and uplift the **Sisters' Unit** who faced hardship and loss during the recent unrest—an expression of the Fellowship's compassion, solidarity, and commitment to service.

Financially, PWF contributes annually to the PCI Mission & Evangelism, General Assembly Fund—and towards Capacity Building & Empowerment.

The Fellowship remains an active member of the National Council of Churches in India Commission for Women Concern (NCCICWC), engaging in ecumenical partnerships and participating in conferences and programmes organized by the CCA, WCRC, CWM, etc.

The **19th Biennial Conference** was hosted by Rymbai Presbyterian Church, KJP Synod Mihngi from 24th–26th October 2025. The conference brought together 609 delegates and representatives from all Synods under the PCI, uniting women in worship, reflection, and renewal under the inspiring theme "*Heal Our Land.*" *2 Chronicles 7:14*

The sessions included a **Keynote Address** by **Rev. S.T. Kaia Vaiphei**, Administrative Secretary (In-charge), PWF; a **Bible Study** by **Dr. Pancilia Thawmuit**, Assistant Professor, JRTC; and a **Message on the Theme** by **Dr. Rosy Zoramthangi**, Professor, ATC. The **Holy Communion** was administered by **Rev. S.R. Dkhar**, Moderator, KJP Synod Mihngi. The **Sunday Worship Services** featured messages from **Mrs. Maya Pohlein**, former Chairperson, and **Rev. Dr. B.L. Nongbri**, Principal, JRTC. The **Closing Service** concluded with the installation of new Office Bearers for the term **2025–2027**.

The Key resolutions at the Business Sessions include a **Charity Grant to Tripura Synod**, **Sponsorship of a Mission Teacher** in the CHT Synod, an **Environmental Initiative** at the PCI Capacity Building Centre, Shillong, and continued advocacy for **Women's Ordination** within the Church.

The next Biennial Conference will be hosted by the **Mizoram Synod** in October 2027, under the theme "*Renew, Restore, Refresh*" (Isaiah 40:31).

The 19th Biennial Conference truly reaffirmed the PWF's mission—to serve faithfully, empower women, and bring healing and renewal within the Church and society.

An online retreat was organized by **MOTHERS' UNION, UK**, along with the president & secretary (SWFCS) & neighboring countries for 5 days & both of them were felicitated with the medal, certificate of participation & letters of appreciation.



- SWFCS takes the credit for Lord's answer to our long-pending prayer that finally Church of North India has three lady Bishops when this report was being written. Our unceasing prayer will bring many more ordained lady pastors & Bishops in the days to come for CNI.

Rathod, Director, Satyaniketan School of Theology, resource persons were Mrs. Vijaya Andrew Rathod & Rt. Rev. Sushma Kumar, Bishop of Chhattisgarh diocese, Revd. Dr DJ Ajith Kumar and Revd. Binod Peter Senapati, who made us understand & realize the true meaning of **DISCIPLESHIP & WITNESSING** theologically & interactively. A booklet of individual testimonies of the participants is on its way to printing.

- Pathankot, diocese of Chandigarh, witnessed the 4th National program of SWFCS organized at Avalon Girls School, Pathankot, on 3rd & 4th of November. Additional attractions were the release of DISHA, the signature magazine of SWFCS, financial help to 14 girl students of 14 dioceses & most importantly, the celebration of FLC theme through a colourful & meaningful skit organized by Mrs Ujwala Reddi, convener, SWFCS. The guests of honour & guest speakers, Rev. Rajkumari, diocese of Chandigarh & Rev. Jyoti Singh Pillai, Executive Secretary, Women’s Concern, NCCI, for their insight related to the theme.

- SWFCS is all set to observe the 16 days of Activism against Gender -Based Violence (24th Nov-10th December 2025) through all the 28 dioceses.

MIZORAM BAPTIST WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Mizoram Baptist Women's Fellowship celebrated 87 years since its inception. The main objectives of the Fellowship is to strive towards the extension of God's reign here on earth and to that end it serves the church, society and family. It has a motto "I am ready to do whatever the Lord has asked me to do." The fellowship has its convention at the Pastorate level every year. According to the latest statistics, the Fellowship has 34857 members comprise of 475 Units.

Major programs

Handful of Rice

One of the major programs of the Fellowship is collection of handful of rice. Every time a meal is about to be prepared a handful of rice is put aside in a container which is kept separate for the Lord. The assigned collectors collected it from house to house. It has been an important ministry and utilised for Mission work of the Baptist Church of Mizoram in and outside Mizoram.

Rehabilitation Centre

The Baptist Church of Mizoram started a rehabilitation centre called Baptist Rehabilitation Centre (Baptist Chhawmdawlna In) look after by the Women's Fellowship and is run with the contributions made by the members.

Relief

Every year, each member contributed Rs 20/- for Relief Fund which is then distributed equally to those who have no one to care for them. The fellowship also contributed to different institutions based on the needs.

Observance of various prayer days

On every Friday night all the Units held a prayer meeting specifically for their children and grandchildren. The Fellowship is affiliated under North East India Christian Council Women's Assembly (NEICCWA), India Baptist Women's Union (IBWU), Asia Baptist Women's Union (ABWU) and Baptist World Alliance Women Department (BWA-WD), every year it observes prayer day of the mentioned organisations.

Fasting prayer

Every year June 30 is set aside for fasting prayers on various prayer items. All units are dedicated for this fasting prayer where participants contributed their one meal in kind and in cash which is then used to help missionaries send by the Baptist Church of Mizoram.

Seminars & Visitation of Units

At the pastorate and unit level, the fellowship conducted Leadership training, seminars and awareness campaign on contextual issues. Every year, the Leaders visit different units to create good relationship, strengthen the spirit of ministry.


