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From Constitutional Promise to Public Witness in the Spirit of Ambedkar

As the Church and country observes Ambedkar Jayanthi, we do so not only in remembrance of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, but in renewed commitment to the constitutional vision he bequeathed to this nation—a vision rooted in justice, liberty, equality, and fraternity. We are compelled to ask a troubling question: What remains of the Constitution when minorities are denied its protection? For the Church, this is not a distant political ideal; it is deeply aligned with the Gospel call to stand with the oppressed, protect human dignity, and resist every form of exclusion.

Today, we witness with deep concern the growing denial of constitutional rights to minorities in India. The freedoms of faith, expression, association, and democratic participation are increasingly under strain. When minority communities live in fear, when dissent is silenced, and when institutions serving the vulnerable are constrained, the promise of the Constitution is wounded.

In this context, the proposed changes to the FCRA framework call for serious discernment. While accountability is necessary, any law that restricts the life-giving work of churches, faith-based institutions, and civil society among the poor and marginalised must be approached with caution. The Church cannot remain silent when legal structures risk becoming tools that weaken justice and solidarity.

The Church cannot honour Ambedkar in ceremony and abandon him in public witness. This is the time to speak, to resist, and to reclaim the Constitution as a covenant of justice for all—especially for those pushed to the margins.

LISTENING, LEARNING, AND STANDING TOGETHER: NCCI ENGAGES WITH MANIPUR CHURCH



NCCI hosted two meaningful interactions at its National Office in New Delhi during March 2026, reaffirming its continued solidarity with communities affected by the ongoing ethnic conflict in Manipur and its commitment to responsive accompaniment, relief, and rehabilitation.

Kuki-Zo Pastor Letlal Haokip and Pastor Sumrengchung Hmangte visited the NCCI National Office, on 11 March 2026, where they were received by the NCCI staff along with the General Secretary, Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer. The interaction focused on the humanitarian response and relief efforts undertaken in the aftermath of the Manipur ethnic conflict by NCCI-CSA, LWSIT, and India Peace Centre (IPC). Discussions highlighted both

immediate humanitarian assistance and the ongoing processes of long-term recovery and sustainable rehabilitation. The pastors also shared their experiences and contributions in extending relief and support during the crisis.

Further strengthening this engagement, on 13 March 2026, the Kuki Students' Organization (KSO), Delhi, led by its President along with fellow members, visited the NCCI National Office. The interaction centred on the immediate needs of Internally Displaced People (IDPs) in Delhi, particularly those affected by the Manipur violence. The discussion also explored opportunities through the Vedhik Civil Service Club for UPSC aspirants, while also envisioning future collaboration in organising programmes together, especially workshops focusing on mental health and well-being. These interactions offered important spaces for listening, sharing, and collective discernment. They also reflected NCCI's ongoing commitment to accompany conflict-affected communities through relief, rehabilitation, advocacy, and meaningful partnerships that respond to both immediate needs and long-term aspirations.

AN INTERCULTURAL PILGRIMAGE OF FAITH FRIENDSHIP AND SOCIAL ENGAGEMENT

NCCI recently organised an Exposure Programme in Nagpur for international students from the Henry Martyn Institute (HMI), offering a meaningful journey of faith, culture, interfaith dialogue, and grassroots engagement from mid-February to March 2026. The programme included Ms. Putri A. D. Manae Sampebua from Indonesia and Mr. Liviwe M. Ndabambi from South Africa, whose participation brought a rich intercultural dimension to the experience. Through orientation sessions, church visits, and interactions with ministries such as All Saints Church, Deenabandhu Ministry, and a Deaf Church, they gained insights into Indian church life and inclusive ministry.

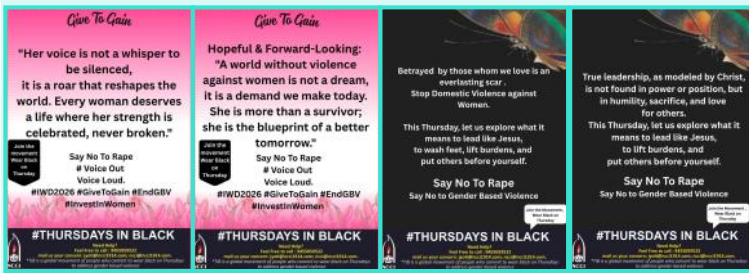
A key highlight was the programme's emphasis on interfaith learning and cultural exchange, with visits to the Dragon Palace Temple, a Gurudwara, a Parsi cultural committee, and Hindu temples. Their



participation in Holi added a joyful experience of cultural sharing and friendship. The students also visited self-help groups at Anand Theatre and Somalwada. Engagements with the India Peace Centre (IPC) and other community initiatives further deepened their understanding of justice, dignity, and grassroots social action. The programme reflected the ongoing collaboration between HMI and NCCI. It was thoughtfully coordinated by Ms. Neelam Gaikwad and Mr. Bevei S. Konah.

THURSDAYS IN BLACK: NCCI’S ONGOING WITNESS FOR JUSTICE



As part of the global “Thursdays in Black” campaign against sexual harassment, rape, and all forms of violence against women, Women’s Concerns of NCCI carried out a weekly poster advocacy. Posters were released every Wednesday around the themes of equality, International Women’s Day, and betrayal during Passion Week, calling for a society where women and girls can live in equality, safety, and dignity. The initiative reaffirmed NCCI’s commitment to gender justice and to building communities free from violence and discrimination.

PASSION WEEK POSTERS AMPLIFY ANTI-CASTE WITNESS IN THE CHURCH

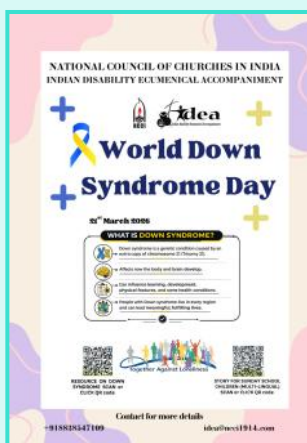

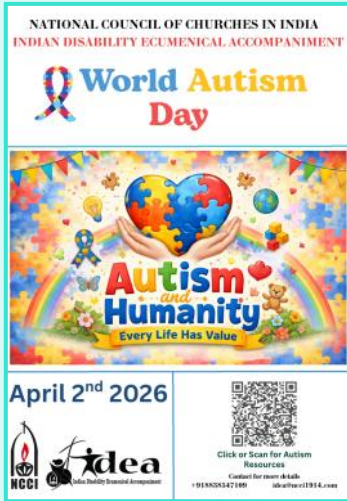
INDIAN DISABILITY ECUMENICAL ACCOMPANIMENT (NCCI-IDEA)

BEYOND INCLUSION TOWARD BELONGING ON WORLD DOWN SYNDROME DAY



The NCCI- IDEA has invited all member churches to meaningfully observe World Down Syndrome Day on 21 March 2026, joining the global observance under the theme “Together Against Loneliness.” This year’s theme draws attention to an important reality: while children and persons with Down syndrome may be physically present in families, congregations, and communities, true inclusion requires much more than visibility. It calls for intentional efforts to cultivate understanding, friendship, acceptance, and a genuine sense of belonging. As part of this year’s observance, NCCI-IDEA is encouraging churches to use Sunday School as a creative and formative space for building awareness among children. Churches are invited to introduce children to the story of Mia, a girl with Down syndrome, through multilingual audio resources or by reading the story aloud during Sunday School sessions. The story of Mia and related educational resources have been made available through the NCCI-IDEA online platform, along with additional materials on Down syndrome, to support churches in planning meaningful observances and awareness activities. By engaging children in these conversations, NCCI-IDEA hopes to inspire faith communities to become spaces where children and persons with Down syndrome experience not isolation, but friendship and belonging. FROM AWARENESS TO INCLUSION FOR AUTISTIC PERSONS AND FAMILIES



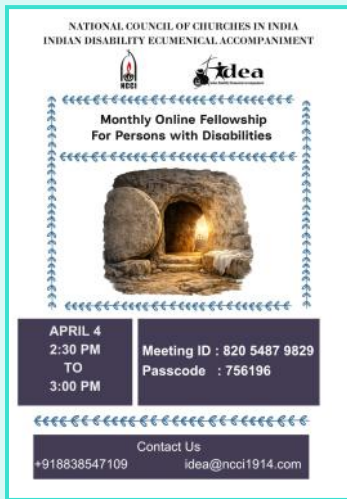
NCCI-IDEA observed World Autism Awareness Day on 2 April 2026, joining the global call to affirm the dignity and worth of autistic persons under the theme “Autism and Humanity – Every Life Has Value.”

The resources were developed to equip churches with both awareness and practical tools for inclusion. They focused on nurturing communities of care by promoting informed and compassionate responses to autism within congregational life. In particular, the materials highlighted practical ministry approaches such as trained leadership, buddy systems, safe and sensory-considerate spaces, and sustained family support, helping churches move from awareness to meaningful accompaniment.

Through this initiative, NCCI-IDEA emphasized that autism must not be viewed through the lens of deficit or exclusion, but through the recognition of the strengths, gifts, dignity, and humanity of autistic persons. The observance served as a reminder that the church is called to be a space where all persons are received with respect, supported with sensitivity, and included with intentionality. As part of the observance, NCCI-IDEA disseminated a specially prepared poster carrying a QR code and a link to online resources, enabling member churches and ecumenical partners to access materials designed to strengthen ministry among autistic children, youth, and their families.

INCLUSIVE EASTER WITNESS THROUGH FELLOWSHIP AND REFLECTION



As part of its continuing commitment to disability -inclusive ministry, NCCI -IDEA organised its monthly online fellowship for persons with disabilities on 4 April 2026, as a special Easter observance marked by worship, reflection, and shared learning.

Vijayawada, presented through an Indian Sign Language interpreter. Dn. Abel Punnoose, Deacon of the Believers Eastern Church in Kerala, shared the Easter message, emphasizing that all persons are created in the image of God and called to be active members of the Body of Christ. In his reflection, the speaker highlighted the urgent need for churches to move beyond stigma, prejudice, and limiting stereotypes that continue to marginalise persons with disabilities. The message called congregations to become spaces of acceptance, participation, dignity, and belonging, where persons with disabilities are not treated as passive recipients of care, but recognised as equal members of the faith community with gifts, leadership, and vocation.

The programme featured an Easter song and intercessory prayer by the Deaf Church Fellowship,

NATIONAL TASK FORCE ON HIV/AIDS (NCCI-NTFH)

POSITIVE ENGAGEMENT STORY ENCOURAGES CHURCHES TO STAND WITH PLHIV

NCCI-NTHF released the Positive Engagement Story of the United Evangelical Lutheran Churches in India (UELCI), one of the constituent members of NCCI, along with a poster carrying a QR code that provides access to information on the church’s positive contribution to the lives of people living with HIV (PLHIV) and their communities.

ECUMENICAL ENTREPRENEURS' FELLOWSHIP (EEF)

STRENGTHENING NETWORKS THROUGH ECUMENICAL ENTREPRENEURSHIP

The Ecumenical Entrepreneurs Forum (EEF) held chapter meetings in Nagpur, Chennai, and Mangaluru during March 2026, bringing together Christian entrepreneurs for learning, fellowship, and mutual encouragement. The gatherings reflected EEF's continuing commitment to nurture entrepreneurship that is innovative, collaborative, and socially responsible.



The EEF Nagpur Chapter, gathered on 18 March 2026, featured Mr. Avnish Thakre, a manufacturer of sanitary pad machines, who shared an engaging session on his business and products. A key highlight of his presentation was the importance of menstrual hygiene awareness, where he explained how sanitary pads work, shared important facts, and emphasized the need to break stigma and sensitise communities. He encouraged initiatives in schools, colleges, and workplaces to ensure access to sanitary products for women, and also introduced a mosquito fogging machine, underlining its significance for public health.



The EEF Chennai Chapter, monthly meeting held on 20 March 2026, included a session by Mr. Alexander Thomas, Creative Director, on the theme "Know Branding," while Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer spoke on "Representing Each Other Together."

The core group of the Chennai chapter visited the CSI Bishop to promote the vision and ministry of EEF within the CSI Madras Diocese. The meeting served as an opportunity to introduce the forum's mission of encouraging Christian entrepreneurs through fellowship, learning, and mutual support. The visit also sought to strengthen collaboration with the CSI Madras Diocese and explore ways of expanding en-



trepreneurial engagement within the church. The interaction reflected a shared interest in nurturing enterprise, fellowship, and meaningful participation in the life and witness of the church.



The EEF Mangaluru Chapter, that met on 27 March 2026, featured Mr. Adolf Jayathilak of Dolfarms Cold Store, who shared on the theme "Start Anytime." Together, these chapter meetings encouraged members to deepen their entrepreneurial vision while strengthening ecumenical fellowship and shared learning.

Through the these efforts of Ecumenical Entrepreneurs Forum, NCCI continues to strengthen entrepreneurial fellowship, mutual support, and collaborative engagement among Christian entrepreneurs, while building meaningful partnerships with churches and dioceses for a wider and more impactful witness.

NEWS FROM CHRISTIAN SERVICE AGENCY (CSA)

EXPOSURE VISIT INSPIRES STUDENTS THROUGH WOMEN'S STORIES OF STRENGTH AND SOLIDARITY

NCCI organised an exposure visit on 31 March 2026 for international students participating in its exposure programme. Ms. Putri A. D. Manae Sampebua from Indonesia of the Presbyterian Church and Mr. Liviwe M. Ndabambi from South Africa of the Moravian Church visited two Self Help Groups in Nagpur as part of the learning experience. Accompanied by staff team members Mr. Rajesh Jadhav and Mr. Sanjay Wankhede, the students visited one Self Help Group at Anand Theatre and another at Somalwada. The visit provided them with an opportunity to interact closely with working women and listen to their



inspiring stories of resilience, collective effort, and economic empowerment.

SUPPORTING DIGNITY IN IMPHAL RELIEF CAMPS THROUGH GAS KIT DISTRIBUTION



CSA distributed 10 gas kits in Imphal on 19 March 2026 as part of its continuing support for families living in camps to uncover and get on with their life. The initiative was

undertaken to assist displaced and vulnerable communities by addressing essential household needs in the relief camps. As a continuation of this relief initiative, four more gas kits were scheduled to be distributed on 20 March 2026 in another relief camp in Imphal. Through such timely interventions, the CSA continues to offer compassionate accompaniment and practical support to those in need.

INDIA PEACE CENTRE (IPC)

NURTURING ECOLOGICAL CONSCIOUSNESS FOR A JUST FUTURE



The Academy on Ecology was inaugurated in Bhubaneswar, Odisha, bringing together 25 young participants from institutions and universities across India for a five-day intensive programme on climate change, climate justice, and ecological sustainability. The sessions focus on climate mitigation, adaptation, resilience, migration, climate and gender, just energy transition, sustainable farming, waste management, and the land-water-food nexus.



The inaugural session featured reflections by Rev Dr. Asir Ebenezer, Joerg Ostermann Ohno, and Dr. Rabindra Garada, who highlighted the urgency of climate justice, community-based action, biodiversity concerns, and inclusive ecological learning. Ms. Ompriya Rath introduced the objectives of the Academy, emphasizing the importance of integrating Indigenous knowledge and modern practices for sustainable climate solutions. [Read more](#)

CHURCH OF NORTH INDIA

EASTER WITNESS CALLS CHURCHES TO HOPE AND PEACE



Churches across the city gathered on Easter Sunday to pray for peace in a world increasingly burdened by conflict. The celebrations carried a strong message of personal faith and of finding the hope of resurrection within local communities, even amid global unrest. Rt. Rev. Dr. Paritosh Canning, Moderator of the Church

of North India and Bishop of the Calcutta Diocese, shared a powerful Easter message, affirming that the path to Christ is direct and personal. He reminded the faithful that no mediator is needed to reach Jesus, emphasising that every believer can speak to Christ personally in faith and prayer. The report also noted that NCCI General Secretary Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer reflected on the distress caused by reports that Good Friday and Maundy Thursday observances were not allowed in Jerusalem, calling churches to



encounter Easter not as a distant event of history but as a present hope amid violence, fear, and suffering. The spirit of Easter was also visible in Howrah, where an Easter rally and procession led by Bishop Canning brought together members of St. Luke's Church and St. Thomas' Church Pastorates. MALANKARA CHURCH

MALANKARA CHURCH RAISES CONCERN OVER FCRA RESTRICTIONS



In a recent media briefing at Pampady Dayara, His Holiness Baselios Marthoma Mathews III the

Catholicos of the Malankara Church expressed serious concern over the recent amendments to the FCRA Amendment Bill 2026, stating that the new restrictions are severely affecting the social and humanitarian ministries of Christian institutions in India.

He noted that the Church has long used foreign contributions lawfully for education, healthcare, and

outreach ministries, but new restrictions and blocked FCRA accounts are hindering this work.

The Church called on the Central Government to urgently review the policy, restore blocked accounts, ensure transparency in renewals, and protect the rights of minority institutions to continue their service ministries without discrimination. [Know more](#)

The festival brought together young people to celebrate rights, justice, and action through art and music, encouraging them to

share their stories, strength, and journeys. The programme featured competitions in solo singing, rap and poetry, folk music, and group song performances. Participants from diverse communities across different regions of the country, including persons with disabilities, took part in the event, reflecting its inclusive spirit.

NORTH EAST INDIA CHRISTIAN COUNCIL (NEICC)

A NEW CHAPTER IN NORTHEAST ECUMENICAL WITNESS



The North East India Christian Council (NEICC) has appointed Rev. Dr. Meyu Changkiri as its General Secretary for the term 2026–2030. With this appointment, he becomes the first person

from the Naga Community to serve as the full-time General Secretary (North East India). According to the report, Rev. Dr. Changkiri will be 1937. Rev. Dr. Changkiri is formally installed during the 5th currently serving as Pastor of Ao Baptist Arogo, Shillong, where he has ministered for the past 18 years. He is also actively engaged in theological education and Christian leadership in the region, serving as Chairman of the Board of Governors of Clark Theological College, Aolijen, Mokokchung, a member of the NEICC Trust Management Committee, and Treasurer of Serving in Mission (North East India). According to the report, Rev. Dr. Changkiri will be formally installed during the 5th Biennial Assembly of NEICC, to be hosted by the Garo Baptist Convention at Resubelpara near Tura, Meghalaya, from 21–24 May 2026, while the formal handing over of charge is scheduled for 1 July 2026. ECUMENICAL CHURCH LOAN FUND - INDIA (ECLOF)

SHARED REFLECTION AND PLANNING FOR GREATER SOCIAL IMPACT



The ECLOF Board Meeting was held on 27 March 2026. The meeting was chaired by Rev Dr Pakiam T Samuel, Chaiperson of ECLOF-India. The meeting provided an important space for reflection and planning, reaffirming a shared commitment to strengthening the institution’s role in promoting sustainable and meaningful service to the marginalised communities all over the country.

CHRISTIAN UNION OF INDIA (CUI)

REVIVING CHRISTIAN PUBLIC WITNESS THROUGH CHRISTIAN UNION OF INDIA

NCCI convened a planning meeting on 28 March 2026 to revive the Christian Union of India (CUI), a lay-led platform originally founded by Dr. J. R. Chandran in the 1960s. The virtual meeting brought together 18 participants to explore ways of renewing prophetic Christian witness in the context of rising religious polarisation. The meeting was opened by Rev. Dr. Asir Ebenezer, while

Rev. Vincent Rajkumar shared the historical vision of CUI as a platform to strengthen the Church’s engagement with socio-political realities. Mr. Arun Amirtham highlighted the urgency of Christian public witness, drawing attention to increasing violence against Christians and other minority communities in recent years. Participants stressed the importance of youth engagement, digital outreach, regional representa-

tion, and multi-faith solidarity. The meeting also discussed the need for founding documents and a strategic plan, while proposals were made for political literacy programmes, policy engagement, and leadership development. A nine-member core team was proposed to prepare the foundational documents and grassroots civic formation initiatives for the revival of CUI.

NEWS FROM ECUMENICAL PARTNERS

WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES (WCC)

WCC CALLS CHURCHES TO RECLAIM MORAL LEADERSHIP

WCC has urged churches worldwide to renew their commitment to justice, peace, and international cooperation amid what it described as a profound global geopolitical crisis. The call was made by Peter Prove, Director of the Commission of the Churches on International Affairs (CCIA), during a lecture in Barranquilla, Colombia, on 27 February 2026.

He called on churches not to yield to hopelessness, but to respond with renewed ecumenical unity, strategic engagement, and stronger interfaith dialogue, affirming that in a time of fragmentation and confrontation, the churches are called to embody unity, dialogue, and solidarity in the world. WORLD COMMUNION OF REFORMED CHURCHES

WCRC APPEALS FOR JUSTICE AND PROTECTION OF UNDERAGE GIRLS IN PAKISTAN

WCRC has issued an appeal for justice and protection for underage girls in Pakistan, raising concern over the continued vulnerability of minor girls from minority communities to abduction, forced conversion, and forced marriage. The appeal calls for urgent action to safeguard their dignity, rights, and future. Through this statement, WCRC urged

churches, civil society, and authorities to stand in solidarity with affected families and to ensure that laws and systems protect children from exploitation and abuse. The appeal reaffirms the ecumenical commitment to justice, human dignity, and the protection of the most vulnerable. [Read more](#)

EVANGELICAL FELLOWSHIP OF INDIA

A GROWING CALL TO PROTECT FREEDOM OF FAITH IN INDIA

The Evangelical Fellowship of India's Religious Liberty Commission (EFIRLC) has released its 2025 annual report, documenting 747 verified incidents affecting Christian individuals and communities across India. Drawn from over 915 reports received nationwide, the documented cases include hostility, intimidation, violence, and discrimination, with Uttar Pradesh and Chhattisgarh among the states reporting the highest numbers. The report highlights incidents

such as disruption of worship services, threats against pastors and believers, allegations linked to religious conversion, and physical violence. EFIRLC noted that the figures represent only verified cases and may not reflect the full extent of violations, as many incidents remain unreported. The report calls for stronger protection of religious freedom and the constitutional rights of all citizens to practice their faith without fear. [Read more](#)
